THE CLUB AGREES TO PROVIDE

- a safe environment in which the Player can learn and develop without fear of abuse
- on going support for the Player at any time.
- a structured football learning programme, appropriate to the age, ability and growth of the Player
- trained, screened and qualified coaching and other staff and facilities.
- guidelines to the Player and parents on the best ways for them to contribute to the Player's football and personal development
- a Code of Conduct and Rules.

****The club will hold x 2 review points in the season, This is when players can be moved either up from development squads or down from Hype squad based on where we feel the player needs to be challenged at that time****

THE PLAYER AGREES TO

- Attend the centre regularly and punctually, behave with self-discipline and give notice of and reasons for any absence
- practice the techniques and skills taught by the centre and attempt to apply them in matches
- attend school regularly and punctually, complete school assignments and behave at school as at the Academy
- Have a desire and passion for football
- Enjoy every session & Game when representing Street 2 Pro
- A minimum standard for professionalism is expected and should be adhered to at all times.
- Players must show great sportsmanship to each other, opposition and officials regardless of circumstances or results.
- Follow our self reflection programme which will be shared in September.

THE PARENTS AGREE TO

- encourage and help the Player meet targets, including this Code of Conduct and the Club's Code of Conduct and Rules
- support the Player without pressure, praise good work and refrain from criticising lapses. Allow the process to set out at S2P and only offer encouraging support from the sidelines
- set a good example to the Player
- respect the opportunity given to the Player
- communicate with the staff, keeping them informed about any matters affecting the Player
- Parents are not too coach from sidelines nor ask their children to play certain ways as this can interfere with the coaches plan or bigger picture.
